Dear Families,

Thank you to all our families for their understanding and ongoing support as some of our services have been disrupted, due to an increase in illness, which has directly impacted on programs. We understand the effect on families when services are reduced and only cancel programmes after all other possible options have been exhausted.

We welcome the recent March budget announcement that each kindergarten service will receive a oneoff \$5,000 grant to help purchase new equipment for play-based learning. This funding means each kinder will see new, inclusive, and age-appropriate materials which may including construction blocks, musical instruments, puzzles, gardening tools and sensory toys – encouraging children of all abilities to use their imagination and creativity, helping them to getting the best start in life.

I hope that our kindergarten families and children enjoy the school holiday break, and we look forward to seeing you in term 3. As always, if you have any queries or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact us, we are here to help to ensure that you and your child's time at our services is a positive one.

CHANGE OF CLOTHES REMINDER

A reminder to families to please ensure you pack a spare change of clothes in your child's bag each time they attend one of our services. Winter has arrived therefore please send a coat with your child to ensure they stay dry and warm when playing outside.

ILLNESS WITHIN THE CENTRE

When a child develops symptoms of an illness while at the service, educators will notify the Nominated Supervisor, or person in day-to-day charge of the service, that a child is unwell. The educator will then contact the parents/guardians or authorised emergency contact for the child to outline the signs and symptoms observed and may request that the child is collected from the service if the child is not well enough to participate in the program or is suspected of having an infectious disease.

Glenelg Shire Council Children's Services is committed to providing a safe and healthy environment while maintaining a duty of care to the children, and all users of Glenelg Shire Council Children's Services.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

On enrolment families complete the Enrolment declaration form agreeing to the following:

I acknowledge that parents/guardians are required to follow the minimum exclusion period for an outbreak of an infectious disease or infestation. I will notify the service if my child has or is suspected of having an infectious disease or infestation. (refer to https://www.health.vic.gov.au/infectious-diseases/exclusion-periods-for-primary-schools-and-childrens-services)

Please ensure the service is notified of your child's illnesses.











SIGNING CHILDREN IN/OUT OF DIFFERENT PROGRAMS

A reminder to ensure you are only signing your child in/out of the program they are attending at the time of drop off/pick up. If you are signing them in/out of all programs for the day (e.g. before kindergarten, kindergarten and after kindergarten the record is inaccurate). If you have any concerns or need assistance, please speak to staff member.

CHANGES TO ABSENT DAYS 1 JULY 2023

The waiving of Gap Fees for children and/or their families having a diagnosis of COVID will cease at the end of this month - 30 June 2023.

The allowable annual absences for children will return to 42 per financial year as well (1 July 2023 to 30 June 2024).

CHANGES TO GAP FEE PAYMENTS FROM JULY 2023

From 1 July 2023, you must pay the gap fee using electronic means.

The gap fee is the difference between your full fee and your Child Care Subsidy (CCS) amount.

Electronic funds transfer, or EFT, is when a customer pays a bill using electronic means. Most families already use EFT to pay the gap fee.

We will only accept EFT payments from 1 July. If you already use EFT to pay gap fees, you don't need to do anything.

Exceptions are available in limited circumstances. If you think you may need an exception, please let us know.

This change will help the government protect CCS against fraud and non-compliance.

VEGE PACKED MEATBALL SKEWERS

500g beef mince 165g vegetables (cooked and pureed) 1 sachet French onion soup mix ½ cup breadcrumbs 1 small onion, diced 1 tsp crushed garlic



- Put all the ingredients into a bowl and mix really well.
- Roll into bite sized meatballs and thread onto skewers.
- Heat a little oil in a pan and cook the skewers over a medium heat, turning until all sides of the skewers are seared.
- Pop the skewers onto a lined baking dish and cook in a pre-heated 180°c oven for 15 minutes, or until cooked through.

Dartmoor Children's Centre

The children of Dartmoor Children's Centre are currently participating in the Premier Reading Challenge. Throughout this challenge, we will be reading 40 books with the children between 8 May and 8 September. We invite families and community members to participate in the challenge and join us by reading a story to the children. We have many books to choose from. Thank you to the families and community members that have contributed so far.

Nurse Annemaree from Dartmoor & District Bush Nursing Centre recently attended our service for a fun and informative learning exercise called 'Glitterbug' and read a story 'The Invisible String'. Annemaree placed a special cream in the palm of each child's hand and encouraged them to rub it all in, the best they can. Once rubbed in, the children were asked to wash their hands with soap and water and reminded that the special glitterbug cream was pretend germs. Once their hands were thoroughly washed with soap and water, each child's hands were checked for germs (glitter) under a UV light. The UV light exposed remaining germs (glitter) around fingers, fingernails and base of fingers that remained after handwashing. The children thoroughly enjoyed this experiment and it's been a wonderful talking point about germs, what germs can do to our bodies, and how to thoroughly wash them away before and after earing, sneezing, coughing, blowing our nose, using the bathroom, or playing outside.

The children are increasing responsibility for their own health and wellbeing as they engage in complex sensory-motor skills and movement patterns. Concentration levels are also being extended as they focus on completing a special threading creation to take home and show their families.
