





A water fountain and drink re-fill station has been purchased and will be connected to the rainwater tank to provide fresh drinking water.

Brooke Davis the creator of the 'Your Wild' children's naturecentric activity books, has been engaged to develop naturebased activities tailored to the natural environment within the Heywood Apex Park area. These activities will be designed and installed on boards around the playground, inspiring children, and youth to creatively learn and connect with the surrounding environment.






